This occurs through a series of stages as their lives change -passage and rites – rituals of social, community, educational, family and cultural immersion of programmatic experiences. This promotes the full discovery of the youth’s intrinsic capabilities as they transition from childhood, adolescence, into society as young adults. *“Failure Is Not an Option” is the motto: and recently, Dr. Ian Buchanan, Imani Board President challenged the youth in their capstone event: to “Own & Know Their Why!”* This school of thought translates into the youth making life choices that are in alignment with their individual goals and not necessarily because it’s a peer or popular choice. Most importantly, the youth must effectively articulate their



aspiring **“Why” into healthy peer, community, and adult relationships.** According to Mrs. Dunlap, *“Everyone must understand that goal setting at an early age is important. The proper guidance by adults is essential to allow the child to make the successful transition from childhood to adulthood. Furthermore, we also understand that knowledge, strategies, resources and accountability are -strong determining factors for the success of every child.”* Male Mentors who facilitated this event included: Naheem Whitaker, Martin Dunlap. Every extended education, cultural, & community experience is designed to allow the whole child to develop naturally all the while being socially aware of their development as responsible citizens. The organization accepts both male and female youth entering fourth and fifth grades. The Rites of Passage experience develops and guides the youth as they matriculate through the program from childhood, into young adults, as they enter college and their careers. The full Rites of Passage experience includes a continuum of wraparound services over a six year period for participants, parents or



extended care givers. The mission of Imani Boys to Men is to develop young boys emotionally, intellectually, physically and spiritually as they transition from young boys to productive and responsible men. The full participation of parents, caregivers, or extended family members is required for the duration of the experience. (4th -12th grades)

The girls participated in community projects, programs focused on self-love, creativity, unity, and worth, historical and cultural significance. The girls also participated in workshops designed around the art of Doll-Making, the art of Quilting and the art of communication through different methods and the Principles of Nguzo Saba.
